

THE GUMBALL RALLY

"The Gumball Rally" is a movie based on the real-life Cannonball Baker Memorial Sea-to-Shining-Sea Race as promoted by writer Brock Yates of Car and Driver magazine. As an ad for the movie states, "the cars are the stars" and a blue 427 Cobra has one of the leading roles, driven by the actor Michael Sarrazin. Unfortunately, of all the cars the Cobra probably has the least time on film as all the others have "shticks" while the Cobra rumbles on.

Many of the incidents in the movie are based on true Cannonball experiences. The first Cannonball was won by Brock Yates in a Ferrari Daytona co-driven by a famous race driver; Dan Gurney, no less. The driving of a Rolls-Royce to deliver it to the owner is also based on fact. The car was actually a Cadillac, but the driver was instructed not to drive after 6P.M. nor to exceed the speed limit. Needless to say, both rules were promptly broken. One crew actually did try to cross the country on one tank of gas! They didn't blow up, but they did need to make one stop.



The best part of the movie (for Shelby-philes that is) are the scenes in the Los Angeles River, which is actually a huge concrete gutter. The Cobra and Ferrari are really hauling, spinning and racing. When they get back on the highway, the torque of the 427 pulls the Cobra away.

Unfortunately, all this action left its mark on the cars. As reported in the Marque, twin Cobras were used in the film so that if one was

"down" the other could be used. One lapse in continuity in the film reveals just how bad it may have been. In the scene on the freeway in L.A. the Cobra has a bashed in nose, but when they hit the river (and spin out), the car is all better. According to Barry Mann, who saw the cars undergoing restoration at Mike McCluskey's shop in California (formerly The Coachworks), they went through a lot. The tab is being picked up by Warner Brothers, so the owners do get a good deal.

This epic should be on the drive-in circuit for a while so if you missed it, don't worry. It will be right up there with "Bullit," "Vanishing Point," "The Last American Hero" and other automotive action films. One word of caution: don't try to enter a Cobra in the real Cannonball. If you manage to get more than 250 miles without it breaking down and actually drive it 35 hours straight, they will have to carry you out in an ambulance. While you recover from kidney failure, deafness, heat exhaustion and roasted toes, however, you can write your friends who think you are so lucky to own a Cobra.

RICK'S TIPS

Carburator Identification 1964 to 1973

If you are confused by all the numbers on a carburator you are not alone. I hope to be able to simplify the carb numbers a bit.

Many carburators on mustangs have had their identification tags tossed. This tag number is also stamped on the carb itself down on one of the legs where it bolts to the manifold. The following is a break down of that number.

The first letter on the carb is C- the C stands for the 1960's. The second number designates the year of the carb. A C4 carb is a 1964. A C5 carb is a 1965. If the first letter is a D the carb is a 1970 carb. The second letter is a number 0, then a D0 carb is a 1970 carb. A D1 carb is a 1971 carb and so forth the third and fourth letters denote the model of Ford. The Mustang designation is ZF. So a C5ZF designation is a 1965 Mustang carb. A C7ZF is a 1967 Mustang carb. A D0ZF is 1970. A D3ZF is a 1973 carb, etc.

The fifth and sixth letters designate the carb as being for an automatic transmission equipped car or a manual transmission equipped car. There are approximately 15 different designations for automatic trans cars and 10 different designations for 4 speed equipped cars approximately. Call me if you need help with your carb numbers.



