
Presidential Perspective

George informed the membership of the recent death of Cindy Smith. Her husband, Don, was present at the meeting. She was a wonderful person, always ready with a smile, and all who knew her will miss her. Our sympathies are extended to Don and their sons, Kevin and Brian.

George reported the results achieved by club members in the recent Asphalt Angels show at The Showplace. Next fall, perhaps as early as November, George would like to put a notice in the newsletter and start working on organizing our display for the Asphalt Angels show. It is always scheduled around the same time in February. We are allowed up to 8 cars in the club display, and this year we could only get 6 commitments after the applications came out in early January. Next year we will start earlier.

Kenny Fischer listed the upcoming car shows. In addition to the local shows, the new season for Mustang Club of America sponsored national shows is also starting. The next MCA show is March 24-26, in Pensacola, Florida. There will be a MCA national show again this year in Virginia Beach scheduled for May 12-14.

Lew Stakes discussed the upcoming parades. The St. Patrick's Day Parade is scheduled for March 19. He has not yet received confirmation of our acceptance into the line up. We will plan to meet at the K-Mart on Glenside Drive at 11:30 AM, move to the Reynolds Metals grounds by noon, and the parade will step off at 2:30 PM. A Ford dealer in Hurricane, West Virginia sent a notice that they will definitely be receiving a new Cobra-R, if anyone is interested. The car will list for about \$54,000 but will sell for about \$70,000.

On March 26, CVMC will take a cruise to Norfolk to eat lunch at The Rainforest Café and wander the new MacArthur mall. We will meet at the New Kent rest area on I-64 at 11:00 AM, and plan to leave there no later than 11:15 AM. Lunch reservations are at 1:00 PM. Please contact Donna Young no later than Wednesday, March 22, if you are interested in attending. On April 1 (NO FOOL'S JOKE) we will collect trash from our section of Otterdale Road. We will meet at the K-Mart on Midlothian at 9:30 AM, to be followed by lunch at the Pizza Hut in Midlothian.

News from the General Assembly

This year the three state car club councils had two goals for the General Assembly session: maintain the 250 miles of daily pleasure driving for antiques and get a rolling emission exemption passed. Both goals were achieved. HB 1522 passed both houses and allows for emissions testing exemptions for all daily drivers once they become 25 years old. This same bill failed last year. The bill's sponsor added to this year's measure an increase of the maximum emission inspection fee from \$20 to \$25 to allow for the loss of revenue from not testing the older vehicles. That had to be changed because another bill passed that raised the max cost to \$50! Emissions testing is about money not clean air. Be thankful that only Northern Virginia has to test. HB 441 worried hobbyists because it included the 250 miles of pleasure driving in it's text. However hobbyists received assurances that the bill would not alter the 250 miles allowed for pleasure driving of antiques. It passed and the 250 miles remained intact. HB 441 allows for the use of the pre-73 plates, with stickers, on daily drivers. Last year the state police and DMV were against the use of stickers on vintage plates. But several license plate vendors complained about sagging sales and the result was the passage of 441. So if the governor signs this bill into law you will have the choice of using vintage plates with stickers on your 72 or older vehicle if it is registered as a daily driver.

There were several special license plate bills passed this year. One important license plate bill that passed is HB 658. It allows the use of 8 instead of the present 7 characters on plates. This means that there will be hundreds more possible combinations for vanity plates and of course more cash for the state treasury. HB 56 will prevent the use of colored glass and plastic over plates. This is because photo red programs are becoming popular and the plastic provides a reflection so that the plate numbers can't be seen by the camera. And the "Bears in the Air" bill passed. This makes Virginia the 31st state to allow state police to use aircraft to run radar. I-295 will be known as the "Korean War Veterans Memorial Highway" and the still under construction I-895 will be known as the "Vietnam Veterans Memorial Highway".

A couple of auto related bills didn't make it. A bill to raise the minimum liability auto insurance failed. The bill to make seat belt use a primary offense failed in the House a few days after an article appeared in the Richmond newspaper. A team of reporters watched the assembly parking lot as the delegates and senators left. They caught all three of the seat belt bill patrons leaving in their cars unbuckled. They also caught half of the Capitol Police driving around unbuckled. I guess they're used to that saying do as I say not as I do.

Ford to Provide Free Installation of Child Safety Seat Tether Anchors

CHICAGO, Feb. 15, 2000 - Ford Motor Company will begin providing free installation of top tether anchors in vehicles for use with child safety seats beginning immediately.

Owners of Ford, Lincoln and Mercury vehicles from the 1989 model year through current model year production will be able to receive the installation by contacting their local dealership.

Top tethers attached from the child safety seat to the vehicle improve forward-facing child seat performance in crashes by limiting the forward motion of the seat. The upper portion of child safety seats are attached to an anchor point by a special tether strap, available through child safety seat manufacturers. The anchor points are located on the rear side of the back seat, in the rear filler panel, on the floor, or in the roof, depending on the vehicle.

"Occupant safety, especially for children, has always been a primary concern for Ford," said Helen Petrauskas, vice president of Environmental & Safety Engineering. "Free installation of top tether anchors will further improve parents' and other caretakers' abilities to securely attach child safety seats."

The US government will require top tether attachments be placed in all vehicles beginning in the 2001 model year. Child safety seat manufacturers were required to equip all forward facing seats with top tether straps beginning in September 1999. This action has also resulted in increased customer demand for the vehicle anchors.

Ford Motor Company was the first automaker to offer built-in tether anchors in the 1986 Ford Taurus and Mercury Sable station wagons.

For the 2000 model year, nearly all Ford, Lincoln and Mercury cars, as well as the Ford Windstar and Mercury Villager minivans and the Econoline van are equipped with top tether anchors.

In a related area, new federal regulations will require lower attachment hardware on all vehicles and child safety seats manufactured for the 2003 model year. This system, called LATCH (Lower Anchors and Tethers for Children) uses rigid, metal-anchoring points in the vehicle seat bight (where the seat back and cushion meet). The child safety seat is connected directly to the metal anchor points in the rear seat of the vehicle. This system provides for a secure and easy installation of the child car seat.

Ford Motor Company is among the first automakers to produce vehicles with the lower anchors. They can be found in both the Ford Windstar minivan and Ford Focus.

Ford Motor Company To Buy Land Rover From BMW

DEARBORN, Mich., March 17, 2000 - Ford Motor Company announced today that it has reached a memorandum of understanding to buy Land Rover from the BMW Group. The transaction is subject to BMW and Ford reaching a definitive agreement, due diligence and regulatory approvals. If successful, the acquisition is expected to be completed in the second quarter.

The acquisition involves the entire Land Rover line of vehicles - Range Rover, Discovery, Freelander and Defender - including assembly and engineering facilities. It does not include Rover's passenger car business or any assumption of debt by Ford.

"Land Rover is a terrific global brand with a wonderful heritage," said Ford Motor Company President and Chief Executive Officer Jac Nasser. "It is our intention to leverage Land Rover to its fullest potential."

"The board is enthusiastic about this opportunity," said Ford Motor Company Chairman William Clay Ford Jr. "Land Rover is known throughout the world and fits perfectly into Ford's growing family of world-class brands."

"In the automotive market Land Rover is certainly one of the most famous and strongest brands in the world," said Joachim Milberg, chairman of the board of management of the BMW Group. "The decision to sell Land Rover was certainly not easy. But in the light of our new strategy, we welcome the approach of Ford."

The Land Rover business will become part of Ford's Premier Automotive Group, which includes the Lincoln, Volvo, Jaguar and Aston Martin brands. Land Rover sales for this year are projected at about 200,000 vehicles.

"Land Rover is consistent with the strategy of growing our global premier brands with vehicles that achieve high margins and are complementary with our present product range," Nasser said. "Land Rover is considered to be the 'Jaguar' of four-wheel-drive vehicles. It solidifies our market position and business strategy for this high-growth, lucrative segment."

BMW announced on Thursday that it is conducting negotiations to sell its Rover car business to Alchemy Partners, a private investment group.


